

MARTIN J. BENISON has been comptroller of the commonwealth of Massachusetts since 1999. In his term as comptroller he has partnered with the chief human resource officer and CIO on multiple projects to improve the efficiency of commonwealth operations, including upgrading the enterprise financial management and HR payroll systems along with multiple projects to move citizens, vendors and employees from paper to web-based interactions with the commonwealth.

He is chairman of the Governmental Accounting Standards Advisory Council, which is responsible for advising the Governmental Accounting Standards Board on technical issues, project priorities, and other matters that affect standard setting for state and local governments' accounting and financial reporting. He is currently a member and past co-chair the Intergovernmental Partnership. The partnership, under the sponsorship of the Association of Government Accountants, is an attempt to bring federal, state, and local government officials together to identify opportunities to improve efficiency and operation across the levels of government. He is second vice president of the National Association of NASACT and a past president of the NASC. He is a public member of the Professional Ethics Executive Committee of the American Institute of Certified Public Accounts. He also serves on Suffolk University's Accounting Business Advisory Board, and is the former chair of the Customer Advisory Board for the United States Treasury's ASAP payment system.

He is a certified government financial manager, a member of the Government Finance Officers Association and the Association of Government Accountants. Mr. Benison published essays on learning organizations, in *Essays on Leadership*, ©2001, NASACT; on large scale IT projects in *A Guide to Cross Boundary Collaboration* ©2003, NECCC; and on *Leadership Secrets of Government Financial Officials* ©2005, NASACT and AGA.

Mr. Benison holds a B.A. in economics from Boston College and a master's degree in public administration from Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government.
